Clergy Corner



Today's readings inspire us to choose our freedom wisely. The first reading from the book of Sirach, gives us different options, freedom to choose fire or water, good or evil, and life or death. It is our free choice to obey or disobey God's commandments. We are responsible for the serious consequences of our choices. In the Bible we learn about the people who disobeyed the commandments and faced the consequences. If a driver misuses the freedom, the life of those who are

on the road will be dangerous. If a religious leader misuses the freedom, the religion will be in trouble. If a national leader misuses the freedom, the entire nation will suffer. Our freedom is not the permission to do everything according to my pleasure and desire but also the satisfaction and benefit of others.

Today's Gospel passage is taken from the "Sermon on the Mount." Jesus explains the real meaning of three Mosaic laws concerning murder, adultery and false oaths. This is possible by controlling our anger. There are three stages of anger; anger in the heart, anger in speech and anger in action. Any of the three will cause calamities in a nation or danger to the families. Sudden outbursts of uncontrollable anger will spoil the peace of every individual. Therefore, the freedom to forgive is to be practiced when we get angry.

Jesus' teaching on sexual sins or adultery is important. It is the violation of the sixth commandment. This week we celebrate Valentine's Day. It reminds us the sacredness of love. Marriage is the union between a man and woman to live in love and unity forever. It is possible only with the grace of God. A married person makes the commitment to live with the spouse forever at any circumstances. The dignity of a person and the sanctity of married life are expressed through genuine love.

Therefore, let us pray for the grace to use our freedom wisely for the benefit of others and obey the commandments of God to establish the kingdom of God on earth.





Gospel Reflection

It's often said that the Catholic Church lays heavy rules on her members, rules that can almost seem impossible. Mass every Sunday? No lying ever? Sexual purity all the time? I recently said to some non-Catholic friends that more than fifty adults were baptized at my parish at the Easter Vigil. One responded spontaneously with shock, "Why would anyone do that?" In other words, why would someone willingly place themselves in a system with such demanding and rigorous rules?


Of course, no one in the history of religions is more demanding and rigorous than Jesus himself. In the Sermon on the Mount, he says you have to be holier than pharisees or you're out. He says if you call someone a fool, you go to fiery Gehenna. He says you can't even look at a woman with lust or you're guilty of adultery (which was punishable by death). To top it all off, he says you can't even get divorced and re-married. Doesn't he know these are basically impossible demands? What world is he living in?

The new one, actually. He is the new world. Jesus' words aren't meant to condemn. They are meant to signal something new, a restored humanity. Jesus doesn't just give external laws; he gives us his Holy Spirit to internalize the law through love. He wants to fill us with his love. That's what the Church exists to do. Love demands extraordinary things. The "demands" of the Church only make sense because she is filled with Jesus' love. That wildly demanding love is why we are Catholic. *-Fr. Saint of the Week

Blessed Brother James Miller, martyred in Guatemala at age 37, was born in 1944 in Wisconsin. Ordained to the Lasallian Christian Brothers in 1969, his first assignment was as a teacher at Cretin High School in St. Paul, MN. Despite his success at Cretin, his deepest desire was to serve the poorest of the poor as a missionary educator.

Eventually the Lasallians sent him to Nicaragua where he served for 19 years. During his time in the country, he supervised the construction of ten new rural schools, helped build an industrial arts and vocational complex, and worked with the government on education initiatives.

In 1979, when the Sandinistas revolution began in Nicaragua, the Lasallians recalled him to the United States for his own safety. Despite his displeasure at this reassignment, he returned to Cretin High School in St. Paul as a teacher but longed to go back to the mission field, writing to his superiors, "I am anxious to return to Latin America." By 1981 his order would grant his request and send him to a new country, Guatemala. where he taught at a Lasallian Brothers school.

On the afternoon of February 13, 1982, while out fixing a school fence post, Brother Miller was shot several times by three men and died instantly in broad daylight in plain view of many of his students. His assassins were never caught. Some claim his murder may have been because of his order's work to prevent the government from illegally forcing native men into the military. The Brother James Miller Fund was established after his death to continue his work for the poor and in 2018, Pope Francis approved a decree recognizing Brother Miller as a martyr. ©LPi
