Clergy Corner



We are on the 7th Sunday in Ordinary Time. This weekend's Readings explain why Christians are expected to be holy and how we are meant to become holy people. The First and Second Readings give us reasons why we should be holy, and the Gospel describes four ways of becoming holy people prescribed for us by Jesus, using three examples of

by Jesus, using three examples of graceful Christian retaliation when people offend us and violate our rights and privileges.

The First Reading, taken from the book of Leviticus, teaches us that we should be holy because it is the command given to us by God through Moses: "Be holy, for I the Lord , your God , am Holy." It also shows us the way to share in God's holiness: "Love your neighbor as yourself."

The Responsorial Psalm challenges us to be holy as our God is Holy by becoming kind and merciful and forgiving, as He is to us.

In the Second Reading, St. Paul gives us an additional reason to be holy. We are to keep our bodies and souls holy because we are the temples of the Holy Spirit, and the holy Spirit lives in us.

In the Gospel passage, taken from the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus teaches us four ways of becoming holy as God is holy. The first way is to abstain from all forms of retaliation. The second way of becoming holy as God is Holy is to take the offense gracefully and love the offender. The third way of sharing in God's Holiness is by unconditionally and whole-heartedly forgiving the offender without planning revenge in any form. The fourth way of becoming holy as God is Holy is to seal our determination to forgive our enemies by sincerely praying for their spiritual and physical welfare and for the grace they need for their conversion and renewal of life.


Thus, today's Scripture readings challenge us to become holy as our God is Holy by loving, forgiving, and blessing others, even our enemies, with graceful and magnanimous love, as our Holy God does for us.


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Gospel Reflection

Of all the things Jesus says which seem totally crazy, this one might take the cake: "But I say to you, love your enemies, and pray for those who persecute you." An enemy is someone who desires the destruction of you, your projects, or those you care about. To love and pray for them is to want their health, strength, and flourishing. But if they thrive, they are more likely to hurt you and others. So, aren't you indirectly willing your own destruction, or that of your friends? If you doubt that this problem is embedded in this teaching, when was the last time you actually prayed honestly for the people you really hate?

How can we solve this riddle so we might actually live this command? Recall that enemy-love is the surest sign that you love someone with God's love, and not with indirect egotism. After all, if my love for my enemy ends up hurting me or my loved ones, it can't be for me. Enemy-love costs more because there are no tit-for-tats. No reciprocity — just loved poured out, and often pain in return. That's why it is so precious and rare. "What is unusual about that?" asks the Lord about love for our friends. Jesus wants us to experience the unusual love which only comes from him.

When Jesus was being killed on the cross, he was loving his executioners. In fact, he was holding them in being as they nailed him to the cross. He loved those who were spiritually piercing his Mother's heart, while they were doing it. And when he rose from the dead, he showed us that this kind of love is always worth it. It's stronger than death. Real love is unusual. *-Fr. John Muir for ©LPi*





Saint of the Week

Venerable Félix Varela Morales was born on November 20, 1788, in Havana, Cuba. After being orphaned at a young age, he moved to St. Augustine, Florida, to be raised by his grandparents. At the time, St. Augustine was under Spanish rule and his grandfather was the commander of the city's Spanish troops. Instead of following in his grandfather's footsteps, he decided to pursue the priesthood. After attending the San Carlos Seminary in Havana, he was ordained in 1811 and began his ministry as a professor at the same seminary. He was quickly revered as a scholar and was elected to represent Cuba in the Cortes Generales of Spain in 1821.

While part of the Cortes, Father Varela petitioned for the independence of Latin America. He also published an essay arguing for the abolition of slavery in Cuba. Not long after, though, the government of Spain was overthrown by France, the Cortes dissolved, and he was sentenced to death for his positions. He escaped to New York where he went on to launch the first Spanish-language newspaper in the U.S., and fostered cooperation between English and Spanish speaking communities.

While in New York, he founded and pastored a parish, The Church of the Immigrant, and was a theological consultant to the Committee of American Bishops as they drew up the Baltimore Catechism. He learned Gaelic and was able to assist with the influx of Irish refugees coming to the US as he played a significant role in shaping how the American Church welcomed them.

Father Felix Varela died in 1853 in St. Augustine. He was declared Venerable by the Vatican's Sacred Congregation for the Causes of Saints on Easter Sunday, April 8, 2012. *©LPi*
